### Back to Basics: Herd Management Lessons from COVID-19 by Betsy Hicks

<u>Betsy Hicks</u>, Area Dairy Specialist with the <u>South Central NY Dairy and Field Crops Program</u> reminds us not to forget the basics when managing cows. During the past few months of COVID-19, many farms have seen the benefits of continuing to focus on aspects of management that can be considered basics. Focusing on these management areas can help make your farm more efficient, even in unstable times. ### Poultry Processing Waste Management via Composting

Now that the weather is finally consistently warm and pastures are lush, most producers of pastured broilers and ducks are harvesting their first flocks or beginning their flock rotation cycles. Those who are raising turkeys and geese are also getting ready to or have already placed their birds in preparation for the fall and winter holiday seasons. As the harvest windows for these birds arrive, producers processing their own birds or processing birds for others need to arrange for a way to dispose of the waste from processing. These waste products include blood, feathers, offal, heads, feet, rinse water, and cooling water and must be properly dealt with to reduce their environmental impact. Additionally, and fortunately, what we traditionally may see as waste products can go on to live a second life as nutrients for other crops on the farm though composting while eliminating the costs of having to pay for other disposal services. Livestock Specialist, Amy Barkley, explores the basics poultry processing waste composting in this article. A lot of calls this week have been coming into our Farm Business Management Specialist, <u>Katelyn</u> <u>Walley-Stoll</u>, this week. Here are a few reminders based on the "hot topics".

• <u>ALL businesses in NYS need a safety plan</u>, including farms of any and all size and production types. These are a requirement, and are a good idea to protect your farm from possible

liability while also prioritizing the health and safety of your employees and your family. BUT – you don't need to reinvent the wheel. Cornell Cooperative Extension has prepared <u>several</u> resources and webinar recordings to help you get started.

- You DO need to provide paid sick leave to employees that are diagnosed with COVID-19.
- <u>CFAP (Coronavirus Food Assistance Program</u>) Applications are still being accepted through August 28<sup>th</sup>. You should call <u>your local service center</u> to get your information and application in via FSA.
- <u>Coronavirus is "still a thing" and we need to have safety measures in place</u>. Even as our region starts to reopen, and we continue to see new infection rates decline, and as the season progresses in NYS we may see outbreaks on our farms. Stay vigilant!
- <u>Health screenings are a must</u> for your employees. <u>This webinar</u> from Cornell Agricultural Workforce Development shares many of the considerations and processes you should consider.
- Food is safe! <u>COVID-19 is NOT Foodborne</u>. However, best practices for handling dairy and <u>all</u> <u>other groceries</u> still apply. Please share this message with consumers as there is an incredible amount of misinformation out there. A great website to use is <u>instituteforfoodsafety.cornell.edu</u>.
- **Prioritize your mental health.** This is a tough time as we're dealing with a lack of rain, questionable cash flows, and new regulations that change every day.
