USDA AMS Meat and Poultry Inspection Readiness Grant Now Accepting Applications The Meat and Poultry Inspection Readiness Grant (MPIRG) program assists currently operational meat and poultry slaughter and processing facilities in obtaining a Federal Grant of Inspection under the Federal Meat Inspection Act (FMIA) or the Poultry Products Inspection Act (PPIA); or to operate as a State-inspected facility that is compliant with FMIA or PPIA under a respective Cooperative Interstate Shipment (CIS) program. Applications are due May 24, 2022.

USDA AMS Meat and Poultry Processing Expansion Program Grant Now Accepting Applications

The Meat and Poultry Processing Expansion Program (MPPEP) provides grants to help eligible processors expand their capacity. Grants are capped at \$25M or 20% of the total project costs. Applications are due by May 11, 2022.
