<u>Vigilance and Biosecurity Can Help Reduce the Spread of RHDV2-Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease</u>

RHDV2-Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease is a fatal disease of rabbits, causing sudden death in both domestic and wild rabbit populations. Although not yet detected in SWNY, it was found in New York City in March 2020 and has been spreading across multiple states including Pennsylvania, Ohio, New Mexico, Arizona, California, Colorado, Nevada, and Texas. This is a reportable animal disease in NY, and reports should be made to the NYS Department of Agriculture or the USDA as soon as symptoms are identified.
